With the start of a brand new year ahead, it's the perfect time to think about making a new beginning in your life. Maybe this year you'll choose to learn a new language or travel to a destination you've always dreamed of visiting. Whatever gets you inspired, it is all about a new start.

Think of sayings you have heard before and what they might mean to you today, as you look at making a positive change in your life – to turn over a new leaf. To start anew means to start again, but in a different way. Nothing ventured, nothing gained is doing something new and different, but finding yourself taking a risk into unknown territory. To break new ground expresses the feeling of newness and is not like anything else that came before it. Out with the old and in with the new is getting rid of old things and replacing them with new things instead; referring to anything from objects to attitudes. When one door closes, another one opens can serve as motivation. It means that there is still hope or opportunity waiting for you. Here is a resident's story about his fresh, new start.

This resident wishes to remain anonymous for this story. He was previously a resident with us, but was unsuccessfully discharged due to drinking. He was allowed readmission to Christian Care in 2015, after being out of the shelter for 2 years. He is a local resident, having grown up and lived in the QCA all of his life. He regrets his actions and behaviors when he was drinking and the role that played in his failed marriages and estrangement from his children. He blames himself for not being around more and for not being a better dad to his children when they were growing up. He is embarrassed by his past and resents being homeless, or rather, resents allowing himself to be in a position of needing a safe, secure and substance-free place to live. This resident has since taken control of his life and his decisions. He is respectful to staff, residents, volunteers and visitors to Christian Care. He is open to constructive feedback and welcomes suggestions that will help him continue to grow. He is regarded as a peer leaders and is employed part-time. He works very hard at trying to put his past behind him. He stays focused on the here and now and lives in the present. He hesitates to plan too far into the future for fear that he will be unprepared to face his challenges.

This resident is living a sober lifestyle and has "turned over a new leaf."
