Spring helps us to realize precious lessons, where we learn the importance of embracing and adapting to change over time. It is a time for renewal and reflection. Like New Year's, with its resolutions, spring can be a time to make important decisions about the direction you want your life to take and the realization that there are some things you cannot control.

Christian Care resident Mark is one of 10 siblings, born and raised on the South side of Chicago. His mother left when he was seven years old and after that he was raised by his father and step-mother. As a young man, he got caught up in the inner-city life of drugs, alcohol and gangs and eventually went to prison. He admits that what brought him to Christian Care were bad choices. Yet, not all of Mark's choices were bad.

He obtained his GED in 2004 while in prison and attended the Pacific Garden Mission Bible Program. Six years ago he moved to the Quad Cities because his brother was here and he wanted to get away from Chicago. He says, "I didn't like who I had become." Mark has been in a committed relationship with his fiancé, Kellie, for six years and they have two children together. He and Kellie are currently attending pre-marital counseling to strengthen their relationship.

In the past, Mark has mostly worked warehouse jobs, but two months ago, he set out to establish his own business, Mirror Image Cleaning, for commercial establishments and residences. Mark is determined to work hard to make things right for his family. He wants to grow his business, get married, buy a house, be a positive influence on his children's lives and provide for them. His goal is to be living on his own by June. Mark's plan for transformation includes the following steps: 1) appreciate your success; 2) learn your lessons; 3) shift your beliefs by focusing on the positive; 4) live your values; and 5) set and track your goals. His advice for other homeless individuals is to "do what you have to do; let God direct your life."

Generous Donation. As many of you may have seen or heard, Christian Care received a timely and priceless donation of a new rooftop heating and air conditioning unit in December, thanks to Johnson Controls/YORK, Republic, Kale Heating & Air Conditioning, and Cattani Crane. The full cost of the unit, materials, labor and crane rental were donated by these companies, saving Christian Care \$7,000.
